In notes from Newton's journal, March 21, 1748, was a day of great importance for him, for "On that day the Lord sent from on high and delivered me out of deep waters." Only God's amazing grace could and would take a rude, profane, slave-trading sailor and transform him into a child of God. And only God's grace can take us, a blasphemer of the Truth, an

enemy of God, and transform us from a wretch to a beloved son and daughter. Our new name in Christ can be "Was Once Lost, But Forever Found by His Grace and Mercy". What joy comes with His grace that overflows in Him!

I thank him who has given me strength, Christ Jesus our Lord, because he judged me faithful, appointing me to his service, though formerly I was a blasphemer, persecutor, and insolent opponent. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, and the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost. But I received mercy for this reason, that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display his perfect patience as an example to those who were to believe in him for eternal life. Absences and Tardies –

If your child will be absent or more than 15 minutes late for school, please notify the office before 9 AM. Class begins at 8:15 for High School, 8:20 for Middle School and 8:30 for K – 5. If your child is late, you will need to sign him/her in at the office before they are able to go to class. This prevents unnecessary phone calls from us inquiring if he/she is home ill. Medication Information –


According to the Nebraska State Medication Act and school policy, written parental permission is required for any medication given at school, including non-prescription medication such as Tylenol, etc. All medication must be in the original container or prescription bottle.

If your child needs to take any medication while at school for longer than one week or carries an inhaler at school, parental permission and a physician’s signature are required to be on file at the school office. Medication permission forms are available at the school office.



Cornerstone Dress Code Reminder –

Jeans with holes that show either skin or undergarments are not permitted in our dress code. Jeans with frays, but no skin or undergarments showing are permitted. If your student chooses to come to school out of dress code, a phone call will be made requesting a different set of clothes and if you are unable to bring anything, your student will be given a P.E. uniform to be worn for the day. Our goal is to set a professional tone so that learning can take place during the school day.
