Administrator's News

Once when Jacob was cooking stew, Esau came in from the field, and he was exhausted. And Esau said to Jacob, "Let me eat some of that red stew, for I am exhausted!" Jacob said, "Sell me your birthright now." Esau said, "I am about to die; of what use is a birthright to me?" Jacob said, "Swear to me now." So he swore to him and sold his birthright to Jacob. Then Jacob gave Esau bread and lentil stew, and he ate and drank and rose and went his way. Thus Esau despised his birthright. Genesis 25:29-34

You may be very familiar with the story of Jacob and Esau in Genesis. In Sunday school as a child, you learned of their birth and their struggle from even within the womb. You learned of Esau's skill in hunting and Jacob's preference to stay close to the tents, of the fact that Isaac loved Esau and Rebekah loved Jacob, of their vying for favor with their father and the outcome of this tension. Often when presented with the story of Esau trading his birthright for a bowl of stew, I scoffed at his near-sightedness and how little he valued his birthright. I thought that certainly if I were in the same situation, I would treasure the birthright and would have more self-control to prepare a simple meal. I was sure that I would never make this choice with seemingly so little thought as Esau. But then the Holy Spirit convicts and reveals my own weaknesses and they look similar to Esau's. Too often I trade the eternal for the immediate, the everlasting for the temporal, the complex for the easy,

and the valuable for the rubbish. I trade the Lord's plans and purposes for what I see as reasonable and probable, trading His glory for what is worthless.

Those who cling to worthless idols turn away from God's love for them. Jonah 2:8

The Lord admonishes us through the prophet Jonah, telling us that those who cling to worthless idols forfeit the grace that could be theirs. Like Esau, we cling to what is worthless, a bowl of lentil stew, relinquishing what is of priceless value, our birthright in Christ. May we instead cling to our birthright in the heavenly Father, God's grace, His plans and purposes, and His grace.

But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, He saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to His own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, whom He poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that being justified by His grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life. Titus 3:4-7



2017 Total Solar Eclipse by Allen Huebert, High School Science Teacher

On August 21st, CCS middle and high school students traveled to Concordia University in Seward to view the eclipse. Over 1000 students from Christian schools in eastern Nebraska joined us.

The event began with a chapel service on the football field. An astronomy professor from CU gave a devotional about how God reveals himself through the wonders of creation.

Ninety minutes prior to totality, two CU science professors began giving a "play-by-play" of the events leading up to totality. Though the sky was partly cloudy, our students were able to view the sun's diminishing crescent with special eclipse glasses provided by CU. At approximately 1:03 pm totality began. The stadium lights were turned off and the music ceased. As the sun disappeared behind the moon, spectators began to cheer. Witnessing totality is truly an once in a lifetime experience. Words cannot accurately describe the experience. The next total eclipse in the US will be April 8, 2024.

The eclipse watching event almost did not happen. On the day prior to the eclipse, Seward was without water due to major water pipe leak. At about 10:00 pm CU officially canceled the event. Throughout the night, city crews worked to locate and repair the leak. By 6:30 the next morning, the eclipse watch event was back on.
