From the Superintendent's Desk

I am a person who likes lists. I have lists written on Post-It notes on my desk to help organize my time within the school day, notes on my phone for safe keeping and maintaining a portable list, notes written on my desk calendar, and lists in my head. These lists keep me focused, help me remember, and manage my schedule. In my walk with the Lord, this affinity for lists also holds true. And one list that is dear to me is the "list" found in Micah 6:8, "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

This Scripture penned by the prophet records the words of Micah. He was an 8th century B.C. prophet from the village of Moresheth, twenty miles outside of Jerusalem. This book has three major divisions, each introduced by the word "Hear," and includes alternating announcements of disaster and expressions of hope within each division. He reproaches unjust leaders, defends the rights of the poor against the rich and powerful, while looking forward to restoration and within nation of Judah. How can I please God? What does He require of me? I love the Lord and want to honor Him, but what should I focus on? We know that this "doing" is not what make us righteous before the Lord, but instead is an outpouring of our love for the Lord and our desire to be near to His heart.

With brevity and clarity, the Lord responds to this question over 2800 years ago to those He loves, to me today and to you. Our God answers, "My child, I have told you already what is good. Please be a person of justice- in all things, be a person of kindness- to all people, and walk near to ME- at all times."

But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that being justified by his grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life. The saying is trustworthy, and I want you to insist on these things, so that those who have believed in God may be careful to devote themselves to good works. These things are excellent and profitable for people. ~ Titus 3:4-8
