From the Superintendent's Desk

This is what the Lord says— **your Redeemer**, the Holy One of Israel: "I am the Lord your God, who teaches you what is best for you, who directs you in the way you should go."

Isaiah 48:17

I love the story of Ruth, a widow from Moab who chooses to follow her mother-in-law back into Israel. She leaves her family and her culture in exchange for a nation and a religion that was not her own. "Where you go, I will go, and where you stay, I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God." Ruth 1:16. And in this choosing, God restores to Ruth hope and love, and weaves her into the ancestry of the Lord Jesus. Moving back into Bethlehem, Naomi guides her to glean in the fields of Boaz, and it is there that Boaz is prompted to become her kinsman-redeemer. This custom of taking in the abandoned or forgotten or widowed is a beautiful foreshadowing of us and the Lord Jesus Christ. We are the abandoned, the forgotten, the widowed, and the One who loves us most redeems us to Himself.

To redeem means to buy back, to free from what gives distress or causes harm such as to free from captivity by payment of ransom, to restore, to exchange for something of value (www.merriam-webster.com). To redeem is giving value and honor to the rejected and dishonored, the one forgotten by the world. But God in His great mercy, redeems us as His own.

Yes, this is most wonderful picture of the Lord's love for us, over and over in His word He tells us that He is our Redeemer, the one who buys us back from the slavery of sin and draws us into His everlasting love. In Him, we are loved, secure, known, honored, and restored.

God gives us a graphic picture of His love for us and His willingness to buy us from the horror of our sin, the sin we choose and go back to over and over again. God comes to Hosea, his prophet, and gives a raw instruction. "Go, take to yourself a wife of whoredom", Hosea 1:2, and Hosea obeys and marries Gomer, a woman redeemed from the sex trafficking trade in the village. And then time and time again, Gomer goes back to her old life of sin and slavery. But God in His great mercy, sends Hosea again to buy her back, restoring to her honor and love. I can only imagine the humbleness and compassion of Hosea as he enters the market to buy Gomer back. This is what the Lord does. In complete humbleness and compassion, He walks into the marketplace of our sin and buys us back by His precious blood. We are redeemed to a life of hope and love and honor. All glory to God that He is our Kinsman-Redeemer, our Beloved, our Hope!

I know that **my Redeemer** lives, and that in the end he will stand on the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, Yet in my flesh I will see God; I myself will see him with my own eyes—I, and not another. How my heart yearns within me! Job 19:25-27

2021-2022 mission trips recap:

For me, the mission trip I took to Colorado this last fall was my best one yet. Back then they wore open toed shoes, had dust everywhere. No Jew was allowed to wash the feet of another, and now Jesus was washing the dirtiest of feet at dinner time. This was unheard of. The King of the universe washed his feet. We were peers and we still did not want to do it. Jesus found us at our dirtiest and washed us clean.
